Getting to Centre Mont-Royal

From Downtown Hotels

Centre Mont-Royal sits in the heart of downtown Montreal — most conference hotels are within a 10–15 minute walk.

From the Airport (YUL – Montréal-Trudeau International Airport)

- **Taxi:** Fixed fare between YUL and downtown Montreal — \$49.45 CAD (5:00 a.m.–11:00 p.m.) or \$56.70 CAD (11:00 p.m.–5:00 a.m.).
- **STM 747 Express Bus:** Connects YUL directly to downtown Montreal; accepts the special YUL fare or a compatible transit pass.
- **Ride-sharing:** Uber operates from YUL — follow signage for the pickup zone outside the terminal.

By Public Transit

- **Metro:** McGill station (Green Line) is about a 5-minute walk; Peel station (Green Line) is about a 7–9 minute walk.
- **Bus:** Lines 24, 410, 420, and 61 all stop within a few minutes' walk of the venue.

Parking

Underground parking is available on-site at Centre Mont-Royal, with additional metered street parking and nearby paid parkades in the surrounding downtown blocks.

While You're in Town

MUTEK Festival

August 25–30, 2026 · Quartier des Spectacles

An internationally renowned festival of electronic music and digital arts, running right through the back half of the conference. Expect performances across multiple indoor and outdoor venues in the Quartier des Spectacles, a short walk from Centre Mont-Royal.

Mount Royal Park

Montreal's iconic hilltop park offers walking trails, a lookout over the city, and green space to unwind between sessions — a scenic (and popular) way to start or end a conference day.

Old Montreal & the Old Port

Cobblestone streets, historic architecture, and riverfront views make Old Montreal worth a wander — particularly around the Banquet Dinner (Pangea) and Ghost Tour evenings, both held in the neighbourhood.

Downtown Terrace Season

Late August is peak terrace season in Montreal — the streets around Centre Mont-Royal, Crescent Street, and the Plateau are full of outdoor dining options for catching up with colleagues after hours.
